#### 1.0 Introduction

The Ministry of Agriculture, Animal Industry and Fisheries (MAAIF), in collaboration with the Agricultural Sector Development Partners and Civil Society Organisationsconducted the sixth Joint Agricultural Sector Annual Review (JASAR) for the Financial Year (FY) 2015/2016. The review workshop was heldon the29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> August 2016 at the Speke Resort Hotel Munyonyo, in Kampala. The review workshop brought together 371 participants who included, leaders and representatives from Parliament, relevant Ministries and Agencies of Government, Development Partners, Civil Society, Local Governments (LGs), Farmers' Organizations, Private Sector, the Media and staff of MAAIF and its Agencies. The theme for the JASAR 2016 workshop was "Enhancing Agricultural Production for Job Creation".

#### 2.0 Objective of the 6th JASAR

The main objective of the JASAR 2016 was to jointly review and analyse the performance of the agricultural sector during FY 2015/16. The specific objectives were to:-

- Create a platform for stakeholders in the agriculture sector including political leaders, sector
  institutions, decentralised structures, private sector, civil society and development partners
  to discuss and review the performance of the agriculture sector, as well as its associated
  policies and programs;
- Assess the trends in overall sector performance based on relevant SDGs, NDP II and ASSP 2015/16-2019/20 indicators;
- Assess the progress of implementation of sector priorities for FY 2015/16 as set out in the Ministerial Policy Statement (MPS) and sector Budget Framework Paper (BFP), this included challenges and lessons learned;
- 4. Review sector public financing for the FY 2015/16;
- 5. Assess progress made towards implementation of the agreed actions for the JASAR 2015 and the cabinet retreat for the Government Annual Performance Report (GAPR) for FY 2014/ 2015 and the Government Half Annual Performance Report (GHAPR) for 2015/16;
- Brief the stakeholders on the sector priorities as elaborated in the Ministerial Policy Statement/budget for 2016/17 and the Agricultural Sector Strategic Plan(ASSP) 2015/16-2019/20;
- 7. Provide recommendations for increased effectiveness and efficiency in sector performance.

#### 3.0 Review Process

During the review that was officially opened by the Minister of Agriculture, Animal Industry and Fisheries, Hon. Vincent Bamulangaki Sempijja, on behalf of the Rt. Hon. Prime Rugunda, a number of presentations were made that included papers on; Agriculture Sector Performance in the Crop, Livestock and Fisheries Sub Sectors as well as Agricultural Extension, Human Resource Management, Research and Procurement of Agricultural Inputs; Local Government Perspectives on Agriculture Sector Performance, Private Sector Contribution to Agricultural Development; The Role of CSOs In Agriculture Development; Challenges, Lessons and Recommendations; Accessing

Finance for Agriculture; Innovations, Opportunities and Experiences: the Agricultural Credit Facility (ACF) And Agricultural Sector Performance from a Ministry Of Finance, Planning and Economic Development Perspective. The review workshop also included a presentation from the JASAR regional workshop held in Sseta Mukono on issues and recommendations they agreed on.

The reviewworkshop also included a session on side events organised by the CSOs who focused on themes of production and value addition, deepening gender involvement in value chains and strengthening agricultural extension delivery.

#### 4.0 JASAR 2016Key Issues

The following are the issues that were raised by participants following presentation of papers as well as from the group work.

#### A. Policy and Planning

#### 4.1 Need to Strengthen the Policy and Planning Function

It was observed that there were consistent delays in review or development of old and new policies respectively. The NSA also noted the poor absorption of 70% compared to the national average of 92.9%.

#### 4.2 Strategic Focus for JASAR 2017

Furthermore, the JASARs so far conducted appear to be assessing a range of areas and indicators resulting in limited focus on what should be the core or key issues that should also be in line with the ASSP results matrix that is currently under completion.

#### **B.** Agricultural Extension

#### 4.3 Limited Extension Coverage

It was observed that there was still very limited extension worker coverage in LGs and that this had a mostly negative direct consequence on the agricultural outputs that were currently being delivered under the NAADS intervention and which represented significant financial value.

#### 4.4 Lack of Capacity Building

Although it has been reported that MAAIF in collaboration with District Service Committees are currently undertaking a massive recruitment drive for extension workers, a glaring gap was development and implementation of a capacity building plan to ensure that they are adequately equipped with requisite knowledge and skills to meet the challenges in the field.

#### 4.5 Inadequate Logistics and Facilitation

It was noted that even the few extension workers have limited logistics and facilitation to enable them execute their function efficiently and effectively.

#### 4.6 Inadequate Funding

Even with the significant funding that has been channeled to revamping the extension services, the issue of inadequate resources still persists.

#### 4.7 Poor Information Dissemination

There is still limited information about the very important outputs being registered within the sector and especially in the Ministry. How can this information be accessed and shared?

#### 4.8 Need for Nutrition Function at LG level

Assured food security and nutrition are important outcomes of the agricultural sector therefore implying the need for creation of a function specifically for food nutrition in Local Governments (LG).

#### 4.9 Weak Linkage between LGs and MAAIF

A key feature that typifies the existing linkages between MAAIF and LG Production Departments is weakness. What can MAAIF do so that these linkages are strengthened for them to impact significantly on efficiency and effectiveness of agricultural extension service delivery?

#### C. Crop Production

#### 4.10 Sub Optimal Regulation and Enforcement Systems

There are all types of fake agricultural inputs on the markets especially seeds and agrochemicals, participants wanted to know what MAAIF was doing to address the situation permanently.

#### 4.11Reduce Creeping Dependency Syndrome

The distribution of free inputs is increasing dependency of farmers on GoU for almost everything. What exactly are Government plans as far as this model is concerned.

#### 4.12 Addressing Adequate Nutrition

What is MAAIF doing to ensure adequate nutrition?

# 4.13 Addressing the Dangers of Aflatoxinson Agricultural Productivity and Human Health

Aflatoxins pose a threat because it can cause liver cancer and possible stunting in children. What is MAAIF doing to reduce the danger of reported increasing aflatoxins in food?

#### D. Livestock Production

#### 4.14WeakAnimal Breeding Services

What is being done to address the still poor and in some cases absent Artificial Insemination (AI) services?

#### 4.15Pest, Vector and Disease Control

Participants reported increased tick resistance to acaricides and were concerned with the increasing fake drug products on the markets.

#### 4.16Animal Nutrition

What is MAAIF doing to increase access to good pasture seed and pasture development generally?

#### 4.17Dairy Frameworks

Up to now and in spite of annual declarations, the dairy policy and strategic frameworks are still lacking. When will the policy and strategy be in place and what is causing the delay and what is MAAIF doing about it?

#### 4.18Dairy Funding

Dairy development needs are great and for the DDA to meet the ASSP targets will require significant funding which is not available. So how can the challenge of inadequate funding be addressed?

#### 4.19Dairy Taxes

There are all kinds of taxes levied on milk and milk products in the East African Community (EAC), MAAIF was requested to see how they can be harmonised.

#### E. Research

#### 4.20Land Encroachment

This is now a recurring problem and as one participant reported land in Labori is currently being encroached upon. What is MAAIF doing to expedite the process of titling all NARO Land?

#### 4.21Delayed Biotechnology and Biosafety Bill

When will the bill be finally enacted?

#### 4.22Poor Information Dissemination of Proven Technologies

NARO presented very impressive reports on technologies generated in their various institutes, however participants noted that there seems to be a communication breakdown because the end users do not have the information on these very important outputs.

#### 4.23Limited Access to and Availability of Technologies

Even when the farmers or end users access the information on these technologies, they are still challenged in terms of gaining access to them.

#### 4.24Inadequate Funding

NARO activities are still being impeded by inadequate funding.

#### F. Agricultural Inputs

# 4.25 Need for a More Efficient and Effective Procurement and Distribution System

Participants observed that although improvements had been recorded in deliveries of inputs, there were still glaring issues that needed to be addressed which were impacting negatively on survival rates of seed and livestock. They included but were not necessarily limited to the following:-

- 1. Inputs now mostly arrive on time but with no or limited notice, limited preparation of farmers and inadequate follow up;
- 2. What strategy is in place to address post delivery follow up of beneficiaries?
- 3. It is acknowledged that not all Army officers in OWChave the requisite agricultural skills and or know-how. How can the link between them and Extension Workers be strengthened and what about motivational issues?
- 4. Lessons learnt so far suggestthat there will be limited impact derived from supplying inputs to small poor farmers especially in seed input production and also the interventions appear to be wide and unfocused. In the Regional JASAR the suggestion mooted included focus ona few areas like disaster, disease and vector control and improvement of water for production technologies;
- 5. In some instancesdeliveries left out the Extension Workers in addition to late delivery times when the season was well underway;
- Last but not least, it is puzzling that GoU can invest significant sums in procurement of unvaccinated livestock, then deliver and leave them to the vagaries of poverty and nature. In most cases beneficiaries have not yet developed the capacity to "properly" manage the livestock they have received;
- 7. Lessons learnt strongly call for a small "investment servicing or management cost" to manage these deliveries while they are in transit or between the Sub County and the Farmers. It is important to note that there is already a precedent under the LG Development Grant.

#### 4.26Limited Follow up

The issue of follow up came up again and again, it was reported that a survey conducted by OWC on coffee seedlings discovered a 30% survival loss, another study put it in the range of 30% to 50% increasing in seasons of drought, which when translated in monetary terms represents significant resources. What is MAAIF going to do to address this issue?

#### G. Fisheries Development

# 4.27Interrupted Regulation and Enforcement for a Sustainable fishery

Followingreports from fisher folk of unwarranted harassment by Fisheries Enforcement Officers, MAAIF suspended enforcement and regulatory operations. This was to enable MAAIF

developed, disseminated and operationalised clear guidelinesand Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) including a clearly defined various stakeholders' role and responsibility regime. However, the 8 month period witnessed significant depletion of the fishery resources. What is MAAIF doing to make sure this does not happen again?

#### 4.28Increased Promotion of Aquaculture Development

Participants appreciated the reported performance on aquaculture development during the year under review and recommended up scaling the achievements registered. However they observed that interest and involvement in aquaculture was hampered by access to fish fry or fingerlings.

#### 4.29Slow Policy Review and Formulation

There were concerns raised on the slow pace of development and review of policies, strategies and other supporting frameworks for the sub sector. Concerns specifically focused on the delayed completion of the National Fisheries Policy (NFP) and Fisheries Subsector Strategic Plan (FSSP).

#### 4.30Enhancing Fish and Fish Products Quality

This issue was in respect to challenges in adherence to required fisheries standards and quality.

#### H. Institutional Strengthening

#### 4.31MAAIF and LGs Establishment/Structure

There was need to lobby for additional wage resources to meet the establishment needs of the new structures in MAAIF and LG Production Departments.

#### 4.32Capacity Building

Participants noted that MAAIF had undertaken limited capacity building mostly because of inadequate resources and yet this was an area that had significant influence on service delivery quality and quantity.

#### 4.33Increasing Human Resource Productivity

The two issues that were raised was what strategy MAAIF was putting in place to address retention of newly recruited staff who departed from the service soon after deployment when the met face to face with the reality of the field including lack of equipment, logistics and other requirements necessary for them to effectively execute their roles.

#### I. Climate Change

#### 4.34Implementation of Sector Relevant Climate Change Activities

Participants observed that climate change was already affecting production especially in marginal areas and raised concerns as to what MAAIF planned to do to address the impending impact of climate change on agriculture.

# 4.35Operationalization of the National Adaptation Plan (NAP) for Agriculture

When did MAAIF intend to operationalize the NAP for Agriculture?

#### J. Agricultural Financing

#### 4.36Limited Information on the Agriculture Credit Facility (ACF)

Several participants had not heard of the ACF and were doing so for the first time in spite of the fact that it has been operational since 2010 when it was launched. Clearly there is need for developing mechanisms to increase information on the ACF to potential and interested users.

# **4.37Need for Lead Institution to House, Drive and Competently Articulate Agricultural Financing Issues**

Following presentation on interest rates and agriculture finance issues, it was observed that developments so far had MAAIF at the periphery and yet there was clear need for a lead institution to articulate Agricultural Financingissues.

#### 4.38Delayed Establishment of the Agricultural or Cooperative Bank

Participants repeated past pronouncements on the establishment of a cooperative or agriculture bank and wondered as to when this was happening and who was driving the process?

#### 4.39Need for Farmer Profiling

Participants observed that access to agriculture financing could significantly be enhanced by having a database with a comprehensive profile of farmers.

#### 4.40Small Scale Irrigation Technologies

Participants and especially those from the rehabilitated large irrigation schemes, appreciated what MAAIF had done and was going to do in the future. However, because the bulk of Ugandan farmers are small scale, what plans are in place to address thefarmers' urgent requirements for small scale irrigation technologies.

#### 5.0 Recommendations and Agreed Actions

The following are the recommendations for the issues; that were raised by participants following presentation of papers in the JASAR, from the Regional JASARas well as from the group work in the side events.

#### K. Policy and Planning

#### 5.1 Need to Strengthen the Policy and Planning Function

The Department of Agricultural Policy and Planning Department will make an inventory and expedite completion of pending policies, bills, strategies and plans. It will also strengthen the M&E function and enforce results oriented performance to address low financial resource absorption.

#### 5.2 Strategic Focus for JASAR 2017

The Department of Agricultural Policy and Planning and specifically the Monitoring and Evaluation Division will identify key performance indicators (KPI) for the next review, benchmarked against the ASSP M&E results framework.

#### L. Agricultural Extension

#### 5.3 Limited Extension Coverage

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management willfinalize recruitment of all approved posts for FY 2016/17.

#### 5.4 Lack of Capacity Building (CB)

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will develop and implement a minimum CB plan.

#### 5.5 Inadequate Logistics and Facilitation

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will compute total and disaggregated need, then cost, procure and provide logistics and facilitation for extension workers so as to enable achievement of impact.

#### 5.6 Inadequate Funding

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will lobby MoFPED for more funding.

#### 5.7 Poor Information Dissemination

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will procure and advertise MAAIF toll free line.

#### 5.8 Need for Nutrition Function at LG level

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will engage with Ministry of Public Serviceon the need for LG nutrition function.

#### 5.9 Weak Linkage between LGs and MAAIF

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will strengthen linkages through regular reporting and communication.

#### M. Crop Production

#### 5.10 Sub Optimal Regulation and Enforcement Systems

The Departments of Crop Inspection and Certification willstrengthen systems through increased infrastructure, personnel, funding and necessary reforms.

#### 5.11Reduce Creeping Dependency Syndrome

The PS MAAIF will issue clear policy guidelines on distribution of free inputs for demonstrations.

#### 5.12 Addressing Adequate Nutrition

The Department of Crop Production will prioritize and increase the current project coverage in areas with high malnutrition levels.

#### 4.13 Addressing the Dangers of Aflatoxins in Agricultural Productivity and Human Health

The Department for Crop Inspection and Certification will through the MAAIF Mycotoxin Steering Committee expedite the development and implementation of an Aflatoxins Action Plan.

#### N. Livestock Production

#### 5.14 Weak Animal Breeding Services

The Department of Animal Production willdevelop and implement a strategy for more coordinated management of Al provision.

#### 5.15Pest, Vector and Disease Control

The Department of Animal Health will do the following:-

- 1. Address increasing Tick resistance to acaricides;
- 2. Strengthen Tsetse Fly control systems;
- 3. Enhance field testing capacity;
- 4. Collaborate with Directorate of Agricultural Extension Services (DAES) on information dissemination on interventions to address tick resistance to acaricides.

#### 5.16Animal Nutrition

The Department of Animal Production will upscale pasture development activities.

#### 5.17Dairy Frameworks

The Department of Animal Production willexpedite development of the National Dairy Policy and Dairy Development Strategy.

#### 5.18Dairy Funding

The PS MAAIF will engage with MoFPED for increased funding of DDA.

#### 5.18Dairy Taxes

The PS MAAIF will engage with MoFPED on the issues of VAT on milk and milk products and the need to harmonise taxes within the EAC.

#### O. Research

#### 5.20 Land Encroachment

NARO will expedite acquisition of titles for NARO land.

#### 5.21Delayed Biotechnology and Biosafety Bill

NARO will institute action for expeditious enactment of Bill.

#### 5.22Poor Information Dissemination of Proven Technologies

NARO will collaborate with the Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management to

develop and implement a model for information dissemination and commercialization of technologies as well as ensure that the model integrates gender and youth issues.

#### 5.23Limited Access to and Availability of Technologies

NARO will enter into negotiations with the Uganda Prisons to use their land for multiplication of seed technologies.

#### 5.24Inadequate Funding

The PS MAAIF will engage with MoFPED to consider increased funding for NARO.

#### P. Agricultural Inputs

# 5.25Need for a more Efficient and Effective Procurement and Distribution System

NAADS will strengthen or enhance quality of procurement, timeliness, and farmer preparedness as well as capacity mechanisms or systems.

#### 5.26Limited Follow up

NAADS will institute improved coordination on management and delivery mechanisms or systems for optimal Al Service Provision.

#### Q. Fisheries Development

# 5.27 Interrupted Regulation and Enforcement for a Sustainable Fishery

The Department of Fisheries Control, Regulation and Quality Assurance will develop Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) and guidelines that clearly define roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders in the subsector in the area of enforcement and regulation.

## 5.28 Increased Promotion of Aquaculture Development

The Department of Aquaculture Management and Development will enhance systems for accessing fish fry/fingerlings and upscale achievements and best practice in feed quality improvements.

#### 5.29 Slow Policy Review and Formulation

The Directorate of Fisheries Resources will expedite completion of the National Fisheries Policy (NFP) and Fisheries Subsector Strategic Plan (FSSP).

#### 5.30Enhancing Fish and Fish Products Quality

The Department of Fisheries Control, Regulation and Quality Assurancewill strengthen systems for adherence to standards along the value chain.

### R. Institutional Strengthening

#### 5.31MAAIF and LGs Establishment/Structure

The Department of Human Resource Management will engage the Ministry of Public Service to consideradditional wage resources to fill critical vacant posts in the MAAIF and LGs.

#### 5.32Capacity Building

The Department of Human Resource Management will source for resources and implement a MAAIF Capacity Building Plan. The Department will also finalize restructuring of the Agricultural Training Institutions (ATI).

#### 5.33Increasing Human Resource Productivity

The Department of Human Resource Management will lobby for Payment of Retention Allowance for MAAIF Staff and endeavour to ensure that staff are provided withadequate facilitation and logistics for operations.

#### S. Climate Change

#### 5.34Implementation of Sector Relevant Climate Change Activities

The Climate Change Task Force (CCTF) MAAIF in the Department of Agricultural Infrastructure and Water for Agricultural Production will strengthen mechanisms for coordination and collaboration with stakeholders.

#### 5.35 Operationalization of the National Adaptation Plan for Agriculture

The Department of Agricultural Infrastructure and Water for Agricultural Production will expedite completion, launch and dissemination of guidelines to mainstream polices, strategies and plans for implementation.

#### T. Agricultural Financing

#### 5.36Limited Information on the Agriculture Credit Facility (ACF)

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management will liaise with Bank of Uganda, Uganda Bankers Association and Ministry of Finance, Planning and Economic Development on methods of increasing information on the ACF.

#### 5.37Need for Lead Institution to house and Drive Agricultural Financing

The Department of Agricultural Investment and Enterprise Development will take the lead role in articulation of agricultural finance issues and will also endeavour to strengthen linkages with Bank of Uganda.

#### 5.38Delayed Establishment of the Agriculture or Cooperative Bank

The Department of Agricultural Investment and Enterprise Development will track progress and disseminate information on developments on the establishment of the Bank.

#### 5.39Need for Farmer Profiling

The Department of Agricultural Extension and Skills Management Strengthen will expedite the planned famer registration exercise and disseminate information as required.

#### **U.** Irrigation

#### 5.40Small Scale Irrigation Technologies

The Department of Agricultural Infrastructure and Water for Agricultural Production will increase emphasis and focus on small scale irrigation systems or technologies.

#### **6.0 Closing Remarks**

The Minister of State for Agriculture delivered the following speech before he closed the workshop.

On behalf of MAAIF, the Hon Minister congratulated all participants for their attendance and extended the Ministry's sincere appreciation for the level of participation by stakeholders. He observed that the workshop facilitated comprehensive coverage of pertinent sector and related issues from the various categories of stakeholders. He further noted that a number of issues covering major areas in the sector were identified, highlighted, which gave rise to recommendations and undertakings not only for action during the FY 2016/17 but also to enrich and address gaps in the current quarterly and annual work plans.

He was convinced that the objectives of holding this JASAR 2016 had been achieved and would effectively contribute to achieving the essence of the theme of "Increasing Agricultural productivity for job creation" This was fully in line with the wider Government priorities as stipulated in the Uganda Vision 2040, the National Development Plan II (NDPII), the Agriculture Sector Strategic Plan (ASSP) as well as the NRM Manifesto 2016-2020 theme of "taking Uganda to modernity through job-creation inclusive development". He also appreciated the attendance of all organizers: participants, presenters, discussants and representatives from the Development Partners group, private sector, session chairs, Ministries, Agenciesand CSOs and assured them that the issues raised would be addressed. He concluded by wishing them all the best and subsequently declared the workshop officially closed.
